




[01] [Anarchist Demonstration Flyer/Ticket] Anarchist Demonstration - Alexandra Hall College of Music, Cookbridge Street, Saturday, February 24, at 8 P.M. Intellectual Bombs. [Leeds]: No Publisher. First Edition. 48mo (Oblong). Unbound. Ticket. Very Good. Single sided printed ticket / flyer for an anarchist demonstration, approximately 140mm x 90mm in size, no place, but Leeds, no date, but 1912. Printed in black,

then overprinted in red when the hall booking was cancelled. Minor browning to edges, but generally clean. Speakers included George Barrett, Mat Kavanauch (presumably Mat Kavanagh) and George Davison (of Kodak fame). The first national conference of Anarchists for several years took place in Leeds, on the 24th and 25th of February 1912, the hall that had been booked was cancelled by the owners at the last minute, forcing the meeting to be held in Victoria Square, but still attracting two thousand people (See Quail, *The Slow Burning Fuse*, pages 272-3). 

The Stoke Newington Eight were Prescott, Purdie, Greenfield, Mendelson, Bott, Christie, Creek and Barker, and they were charged with "unlawfully and maliciously to cause explosions likely to endanger life or cause serious injury to property" (Carr, *The Angry* Brigade, page 139). [05] [British Union of Fascists] Manuscript Notes and **Essays By C.F. Watts.** Ascot and Peveril: No Publisher, 1940. First Edition. 12mo. Hardback. Manuscript. Good. [82]pp, (of text, many others blank), manuscript notebook, approximately 115mm x 165mm in size, dated 1940 and 1941. Binding in fair condition only, back strip loose and defective, front joint weak but holding, worn to extremities. Internally fairly bright and clean. Notes by C.F. 'Charlie' Watts, a district leader (Westminster St George) in the BUF, who had been "charged by some of our comrades to keep it, get it out of camp and hand it to you [Mosley] in person". The first section, in a neat hand, details the British Union's organisation and objectives at Ascot Camp, in October 1940, where many 18b internees were held (people suspected of Nazi sympathies). The second section details the celebrations held in the camp to mark Mosley's birthday, with a drawing in ink of the stage

set up, noting "it is a great pity that we are separated from our Leader at Brixton and our womenfolk at Holloway", regional leaders of the BUF then give speeches, with the BUF choir then singing songs seemingly composed at the camp. The lyrics to these songs are then noted. The third section lists many (all?) those interned at the time, with their names, district and 'rank'. The fourth section relates to another account of Mosley's birthday, reported by C. Hill, to Watts, this is followed by a poem *To an Unknown Blackshirt*, later

identified as [George] Palmer Thompson of High Wycombe, who died while interned in Walton Jail, followed by a song, *Defiance Song*, composed by J. Finnie in the Ascot Camp. The final section is a retrospective look at life in the Ascot Camp, again written by Watts, by now interned in Peveril 'Concentration' Camp (on the Isle of Man). Watts notes that "I do not profess to be a great man and I realise only too well my limitations. I am just an ordinary person - fixed with a passionate regard for Oswald Mosley and interested solely in the spiritual aspect and destiny of British Union and when I look back on these days at Ascot, it is with profound pride". Watts, once of the R.A.F., apparently served with T.E.

Lawrence during the First World War. Many, but not all, of the men listed as internees are found in the online 18b detainees list. Watts' experiences in the camps were apparently later written down and called *It Has Happened Here*, but are unpublished; this note book could well be the original source of this later account [002907] £750.00








light foxing. The front is an adaptation of 'Ten Green Bottles',







First Edition. Folio. Unbound. Broadside. Good. Single sided printed broadside, approximately 215mm x 335mm in size. Slightly creased, lightly browned, with a few small spots to foot, small closed hole towards bottom third, catching text but with no loss of sense, note in pen to reverse. The printer Drakard, not found in Mansfield in the BBTI, (but there is a John Drakard in Stamford by 1800, so possibly the same man), has cunningly used the broadside to advertise for an apprentice within his imprint, 'Drakard, Printer, Mansfield; by whom an Apprentice is wanted'. This Mansfield Association was probably raised in response to the Defence of the Realm Act of 1798, which had instructed local authorities to canvass every able bodied man between the ages of fifteen and sixty about his willingness to take up arms in his country's defence. The first English edition (first published in French in the same year), translated, edited and with an extra chapter on the English anarchist movement by Derechef, in better condition than usually found. 

Good / No Jacket. xix, [1], 348pp. Original cloth, title, author and publisher in gilt to spine, with title and author in gilt to upper cover, blind stamped device of publishers to centre of lower cover. Slightly rubbed, especially to edges, edges of text block browned and foxed. Light foxing to first and last few pages, with a few spots throughout as usual, but generally fairly clean. First English edition of Kropotkin's important contribution to the evolutionary debate. Huxley's *The Struggle for* Existence in Human Society, prompted Kropotkin to write a series of replies in *The Nineteenth Century* magazine, which developed into *Mutual Aid*. For Kropotkin, rather than competition, natural selection, "generated a historical tendency toward cooperation in nature, including human society before the emergence of the modern state. In both realms mutual aid was the chief source of evolutionary progress" (Todes, page 132). 

Lightly browned, spine worn, small hole to centre, otherwise clean. Programme for a lecture at the New Islington Hall, Ancoats, Manchester, by Princess (presumably Sophie, but possibly Alexandra) Kropotkin about Russia, with violin recitals. Lower cover with attractive head piece by Walter Crane over 'Free Russia' headline with poems by William Watson underneath. Not in COPAC (though Manchester does have the programme for the lecture in 1910 by Princess Kropotkin on the Russian Village Community). Kropotkin himself had also lectured at the Ancoats Brotherhood set up by Charles Rowley (See Waters, British Socialists and the Politics of Popular Culture) [002912] £20.00





Poster designed by Robin Fior for the newspaper *Black Dwarf*, (named after Wooler's nineteenth century newspaper), with the poem *Know Thy Enemy* by Christopher Logue [002905] £495.00

Spine dulled, lightly rubbed to extremities, small amount of mottling to cloth to upper cover, text lightly browned, half title, final text leaf and rear endpaper browned. Evidence of the removal of a sticker to rear pastedown. There appear to have been at least three different colour cloths used on the first edition. blue, red and wheat (as here), with some minor variations in design. The pseudonym disguises the Rossetti sisters, the daughters of William Michael Rossetti, nieces of Christina and Dante Gabriel Rossetti, and cousins of Ford Madox Ford, and their (barely) fictionalized account of their actual experience as young editors of their anarchist newspaper The Torch, The Tocsin in the book. Shaddock, in her introduction to the paperback reprint of the novel, notes that it "provides a rare perspective of *fin-de-siecle* anarchism as experienced by two highly literate and politically active women". 
