



An album of seventy-five broadsides, squibs and songs relating to elections in Oxford, various publishers, dates, (mainly between 1801 and 1812), and sizes, pasted into an album with a few loosely inserted. The album is broken into several parts with the covers detached and stitching broken, the items themselves are often unevenly trimmed, but are generally fairly bright and clean, with full details of each item listed below.

Oxford was one of the larger freeman boroughs: in 1796 890 voted in three days, in 1802 1,186 in three days, in 1806 1,353 in six days, in 1812 1,538 in nine days and in 1818 1,143 in 4 days, from a population of about twelve thousand. For a short overview of Oxford electoral politics of the period, see Thorne (Ed), *The History of Parliament: The House of Commons*, 1790-1820.


Any printer's details have only been attached to the first instance of that imprint, in order to reduce repetition of information. All items with an imprint were printed in Oxford, and it is likely that those without an imprint were too. All items are seemingly uncommon, with only one item (no.25) found in COPAC and even then only in one location (Oxford), though I suspect that there are uncatalogued copies of many of these items in the libraries of Oxford colleges. The pictures in the printed catalogue are quite small, but larger digital images are available upon request.





Shipping Intelligence EXTRAORDINARY.

GREAT fears are entertained for the Ship Ashhurst, which left St. Stephen's with a Cargo of Government Lumber on the 2d of June. She was last seen in a violent storm, with her Canrass much shattered, attempting to weather the Cape of Good Hope, the Ship Fane in company, which vessel had her in tow for some time; but the waves running mountains high, the Commander of the Fane, to save his own vessel, was compelled to east off the Ashhurst. The Cook of the Ashhurst, at the commencement of the gale, was washed overboard, but was happily picked up by the Fane. The Ashhurst, before leaving St. Stephen's, ran foul of the Cumberland, and received so much damage, that orders have been given for her being broken up.












