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

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



Some discolouring to the green paper stock, some creasing, but generally clean. Largely made up of adverts, this is a programme for Bull's lecture on the Boer War, finishing at the Relief of Ladysmith, and showing "over 200

photographs of the actual fighting taken by him under fire at the front". He returned from South Africa in 1900, so presumably this was undertaken relatively quickly upon his return. For Bull see Houfe, page 81 [003369] **£35.00**



sided printed election squib, approximately 220mm x 135mm in size, n.d. but probably 1820. Very minor browning and soiling, generally fairly clean. Election squib in the popular form of a horse racecard parody, including their 'colours' and the 'bookmakers odds', almost certainly for the 1820 Ipswich election, at which Haldimond and Barrett-Lennard were returned against Cricket and Round, with the other candidates listed here being Baring and ?Wilkes. The printer was probably Robert Deck, with the BBTI giving his trading dates as 1808-1860. He also owned a circulating library [003367] **£45.00**



[04] [Entomological Pins] **Entomological Pins Manufactured By D.F. Tayler & Co.** No Place: No Publisher, First Edition. 24mo. Unbound. Sample. Good. Entomological pin manufacturers sample, approximately 80mm x 125mm in size (closed), no publisher, place or date (c.1880). Rubbed with small amounts of surface loss to extremities, couple of pins missing from sample case, with some surface abrasions to centre. Attractive sample case, with an

engraving of the New Hall Works in Birmingham to the lower cover. D.F. Tayler was founded in 1787 and by 1880 they had a machine capable of making two hundred thousand pins a day and by 1900 they were making twelve million pins a day (See *Grace's Guide to British Industrial History*). 
[06] [Shakespeare's Tercentenary Tickets] Three Tickets to Events to Celebrate the Tercentenary of Shakespeare's Birth. London: Day & Son [Printer], 1864. First Edition. 24mo (Oblong). Unbound. Ticket. Good. Three printed tickets, two approximately 220mm x 125mm in size and the other 90mm x 60mm in size. Minor soiling, minor wear, but generally fairly clean, with the larger two tickets retaining their perforated strips, so presumably unused. The smaller 'Steward's Pass' has a small stain to head and has not been filled in. The Tercentenary celebration started on Saturday April 23rd, with a display of fireworks by Mr. Darby, the 'celebrated pyrotechnist', and ended on Friday April the 29th (though there were other 'popular entertainments' on Saturday the 30th and Monday the 2nd May). The 'grand concert' was described in the official programme as a "miscellaneous concert of music associated

with the works of Shakespeare" and included Beethoven's *Coriolan Overture*. The performance of *Hamlet* didn't take place, according to the official programme, it should have been performed by the company of the Royal Lyceum Theatre, however Mr. [Charles] Fechter, had, "at the eleventh hour, withdrawn from his engagement", so Mr Vining of the Princess's Theatre staged *Romeo and Juliet* and *A Comedy of Errors*. In a footnote to the official programme, it is noted that "Tickets issued for *Hamlet* can be exchanged for any other Entertainment for the which the price is the same, or the money will be returned on application at the Ticket Office". The printers were Day & Son of London, also trading as Day and Haghe (see BBT1) [003359] **£175.00**


renew or refuse liquor licences in their own area but it failed to pass through Parliament [003370] **£45.00**








margins, ink trials to rear endpaper and rear pastedown, previous owners name to ffep, 'George Edwards' to reverse of portrait frontispiece, (not in his hand), with slight bleed through, bookplate of Charles Home Lloyd Fitzwilliams of Cilgwyn to front pastedown. The Cato Street Conspiracy was a plot to assassinate the Cabinet at a dinner at Lord Harrowby's house in Grosvenor Square, the plot was betrayed by Edwards. Thistlewood, Ings, Brunt, Tidd and Davidson were hanged and beheaded, with five others transported for life to New South Wales. Edwards is generally held to have been an *agent provocateur* and after questions were raised in Parliament about his role in the conspiracy, he slipped out of the country with government assistance and relocated to South Africa. An uncommon work, sympathetic to the conspirators, noting that Edwards was "a name which the future historian of our country will hand down to posterity in company with an Oliver, a Castles and a Reynolds ... this being, for it would be libelling our species to denominate him man".
