



Hardback. Good. [4], 92pp, plates. Contemporary quarter ? roan and marbled paper over boards, smooth spine divided into five panels by gilt single rules, titled directly in gilt to second panel. Back strip heavily worn, split and creased, chipped to spine ends, outer joints split, but holding well, corners worn, marbled paper rubbed.


Front inner joint cracked but holding well, light browning throughout, plates with some light browning and off setting. With twenty-eight attractive folding engravings as called for (copied from Hunter's edition of Evelyn's *Sylva*, so presumably after John Frederick Miller). First published in 1802, with the second edition in 1815. Aikin (1747-1822) was a physician and author, and was John Howard's literary executor. Lucy Aiken, the author, was his daughter (see DNB) [003739] **£75.00**








Clapham to Harry Godwin, with note to ffeq. Included is a copy of the menu from a luncheon given to mark the publication


of the work, which is signed by the editors and many other botanists (presumably the contributors), with Godwin's name in pencil to head. Clapham, at the request of A.G. Tansley, coined the term 'ecosystem', and this flora "was the first, and for several decades the only, comprehensive flora of the British Isles" (Wikipedia) [003750] **£25.00**



One or two pencilled lines and notes to text, but generally fairly bright and clean. Folding colour map as frontispiece is

lightly foxed with a small tear to joint. With folding map and six portraits as called for. From the library of the botanist David Bellamy with his signed bookplate to front pastedown. The introduction includes a history of botanical research in Cornwall. A supplement was published in Truro in 1922 by Thurston and Vigurs

Original grey card covers. Spines slightly faded, the first five with the name of H. Light foxing to edges of text block, internally quite bright and clean. Folding map to first and last parts (the same map), and fourteen photographic plates (as called for). 




Full calf, original boards, later rebacked in a lighter colour calf, raised bands, spine in seven panels, title label to second panel, remaining panels with central fleuron device in black, date in gilt to foot of spine. Corners and edges heavily bumped and worn with loss of leather, old calf to covers blackened, worn and

scraped. New endpapers, lightly browned with occasional hints of light damp staining, but generally fairly clean. Small black mark to Xx<sup>2v</sup>, catching a couple of letters, but without loss of sense; small worm track to top margin from 3K to 3O becoming a single hole from 3P-4A; small chip and tear to top margin of 4K; lacking Plate 47; Plate 48 missing piece from fore edge margin (not affecting image); light staining from leaves to 5M<sup>2</sup>, 5U and 5U<sup>2</sup> and 6P<sup>2v</sup> and 6U. The work was initially published in fifty-two weekly parts at 6d, between January 1756 and January 1757. With engraved frontispiece by H. Roberts (Henry Roberts, see Alexander, *A Biographical Dictionary of British and Irish Engravers 1714-1820*, pages 752-3) and vignette to title engraved by C.[harles] Grignon (Alexander, page 404), both being after Samuel Wale, title in red and black. With 74 of 75 engraved plates, lacking plate 47. The plates are engraved by several hands including H. Roberts, Darly and Edwards (see Alexander pages 264-269 and 316), R.[obert] Benning (see Alexander page 109), Boyce (probably Samuel Boyce, an apprentice of John Pine, and later

a poet (see Alexander age 142), with several unsigned. The plates are dismissed by Henrey as being "sufficiently clear for the plants depicted to be recognized [but] they have little scientific or artistic merit" (Henrey II: 92). However, Henrey notes that the "genera and species are clearly described ... and the work is of importance as ... a number of generic names used by pre-Linnaean authors, but suppressed by Linnaeus, retain here their first pre-Linnaean significance, and were thus restored to botanical nomenclature ... [it] is also of interest for Hill's criticism of Linnaeus" (Henrey II: 94). Nissen 881; Pritzel 4063; Henrey 798 [003738] **£450.00**









Contemporary calf, later rebacked, raised bands, spine in six panels, leather title label to second panel, remaining panels with central volute device

in gilt. Leather to covers worn, corners lightly bumped. Pastedowns unstuck and front pastedown detached, with many pages, (something like a fifth of the total), very heavily browned, though readable, and almost all of the rest of the text and images are browned and foxed to varying degrees, with almost none unaffected. Tear to top margin of B<sup>4</sup>; top corner missing from D<sup>3</sup>; small hole to I<sup>3</sup> catching a small part of the image and a couple of letters to reverse but with no loss of sense; tear to top margin of K<sup>6</sup> not affecting text; top corner missing from both Mm<sup>5</sup> and Mm<sup>6</sup>; 3E<sup>4</sup> missing a piece from the fore edge margin, again not affecting text and final blank with tear. Small booksellers label of Marks & Co. to reverse of front board. With both woodcut and letterpress titles. Parkinson's famous gardening book, here "much corrected and enlarged", (though with the same number of pages as the earlier editions), the woodcut title depicting the garden of Eden with Adam and Eve tending the flowers and a representation of the 'Vegetable Lamb' growing on a stalk, which was supposed to be both an animal and a living plant, and said to grow in Scythia (for a thorough description of this legend, see Rohde *The Old English Herbals*, pages 142-151). The illustrations are seemingly by Christopher Switzer (despite the A. Switzer signature on the woodcut title), and according to Henrey are "mostly new figures, but some are copied from previous works" (Henrey I, page 161). The work is divided into three parts, dealing with the flower garden, kitchen garden, and orchard. Henrey notes that its charm "lies in the author's love of plants and his sensibility of their beauty, feelings strongly reflected throughout his writing" (Ibid, page 164). First published in 1629, there was another edition in 1635 and then this 1656 edition. This is the more common of the two 1656 variants, with 'S. Pauls-gate' on the printed title. seven panels, title label to second panel, remaining panels with central floral gilt device, date to foot, covers with Cambridge panel design. Spine slightly faded, some rubbing to extremities, though generally in good order externally. Engraved and letterpress titles laid down on linen, with the engraved title lacking the gutter edge, the top right hand corner, most of the fore edge margin and bottom right hand corner with some loss to the image and the letterpress title lacking the top right hand corner. Lightly browned and foxed throughout, many small nicks and tears. Fore edge margin of Ee<sup>3</sup>, Ee<sup>4</sup>, Gg<sup>3</sup> and Gg<sup>4</sup> repaired, old tear repaired to 4K<sup>5</sup> catching text but with no loss of sense, 4X<sup>1</sup> with repair to top margin, the English index leaves (pages 1735-end) are all reinforced to edges, with the errata leaf laid down on paper. Name and address of previous owner to front free endpaper. The engraved title is by W.[illiam] Marshall, with Adam and Solomon either side of the title, (representing Toil and Wisdom respectively), and at the four corners are female representations of continents, Asia on a rhinoceros, Europe in


a chariot, Africa riding a zebra and America riding a long-eared sheep (here largely absent), and it also includes a portrait of the author wearing a cap and holding a flower to the foot of the design. Smith in Henrey notes that "This work and the herbal of Gerarde were the two main pillars of botany in England till the time of Ray, who indeed gave them fresh importance by his continual reference to their contents" (Henrey Pg 79).

"Parkinson, John (1566/7-1650), apothecary and herbalist ... Parkinson became so well respected in his profession that he was one of the five apothecaries who were consulted by the College of Physicians during the compilation of the first Pharmacopoeia Londinensis ... Parkinson's second work, which occupied him for many years, was *Theatrum botanicum* (1640), with more than 1700 pages. This described some 3800 plants and showed his extensive reading of the period's authorities; of particular value was the almost entire incorporation of Caspar Bauhin's *Pinax*, for its synonyms. Parkinson divided plants into seventeen 'tribes', based partly on their medicinal qualities and partly on habitat. William How in 1655 roundly accused him of plagiarizing the work of Matthias L'Obel, but Parkinson had acknowledged his debt to him, and as one historian wrote, 'He has taken very little, for the simple reason that very little was worth taking' (Raven, 268).


Certainly John Ray did not despise the work, for he termed it 'the most full and comprehensive book of that subject extant' (Raven, 272), and frequently quoted from it" (ODNB). With c.2714 woodcuts to the text, the largest of the English herbals and includes the names of twenty-eight species not previously recorded in Britain. 






Rubbed to extremities, light staining to endpapers (probably from old leather turn ins), text lightly browned, but quite clean. Largely unopened at head. Gift inscription to head of title, 'C.S. Sherrington to A.G. Tansley (Tansley's name added later

in Tansley's hand), Caius Coll. Camb. 1883', and with a letter laid in from Sherrington to Tansley, dated 1931, gifting the book and asking his forgiveness for the poor external condition of it. The author H.C. Watson (1804-1881), was a botanist, he considered this work a second edition of his 1832 Edinburgh published *Outlines of the Geographical Distribution of British Plants*. His herbarium is preserved at Kew (DNB) [003746]
