

PROCLAMATION.

Made to every Man in the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, this First Day of August, in the Year of our Lord One Thousand Eight Hundred and Three, and in the Forty-fourth Year of the Reign of our especially dear Son KING GEORGE THE THIRD.

WHEREAS by the Blessing of God, the Patriotism, Courage and Industry of Englishmen, the natural Advantages of our Situation, the Excellence of our Constitution, and the Wise Administration of our Government, we are a Glory to ourselves, the Seat of Freedom, the Empire of Happiness and Wealth, and idistress of the Seas:-And whereas at the Head of the Corrupt and Despotic Government of the Neighbouring Realm of France, there is an USURPER, a Consider by birth, and called by the Name of NAPOLEONE BUONAPARTE, who having subjugated to the most Abject Slavery the whole of the vast Empire over which he unjustly reigns, and on the Continent of Europe, as well as in Asia, Egypt and Syria, and divers other places, spread MURDER, RAPINE, SLAVERY and DEATH, in Cruel and horrible Wantonness; and not having the Fear of God before his Eyes, but being thereto moved by the instigation of the Devil, and filled with Envy, Malice, and Hatred to Us for the aforesaid Blessings We enjoy, as well as at our Magnanimous. Resolution to resent effectually his Outrages and Insults, bath presumptuously threatened, and doth actually intend to attempt an INVASION OF OUR LAND, and for which said Diabolical Purpose he hath been, and at present is collecting a vast Armed Force, whose Orders are to Murder all our Inhabitants bearing Arms in our Defence, violate the Wives and Daughters of our People, and plunder our Cities; and all this to reduce this Happy and Independent Empire to a mere Province under his Vile Dominion: We have therefore thought fit to address this Proclamation unto you, calling upon you as you would express your Love to us, and your wish to transmit to Posterity your Country as you received it from the hands of your Forefathers, and to preserve yourselves and yours from the aforesaid Barbarous and Sanguinary Measures, that you, with one heart, immediately give effect to the Wise and Salutary Proceedings of our Government, thereby exhibiting to those who would destroy You, AN ARMED HOST OF BRITISH FREEMEN, READY TO DIE IN OUR DEFENCE-And aitho' in Reliance on God, we know the Blood and utter Discomfiture of the Enemy will be the price of his Temerity, yet it is your Duty so to arouse and prepare yourselves, and so vigorously and unanimously to join in the Common Cause, that you may be able not only to inflict an Awful Punishment on the Legions of Murderers who may assail you, but by a Grand and Dreadful Direction of your Vengcance, strike Deadly Terror and Confusion into the Hearts of all your Enemics: - And as our brave SEAMEN, should they meet them, will save you on Land, great part of the trouble, if not the whole, yet as in the nature of things our Fleets may miss them, have no other reliance for your safety than what arises from TRUST IN PROVIDENCE, CONFIDENCE, UNANIMITY, AND VIGOUR AMONG YOURSELVES. The printer was J.[ames] Asperne, at the 'Bible, Crown, and Constitution' (no radical he!)

One of many 'invasion threat' broadsides published in 1803, with the usual terrifying visions of the outcome of an invasion by Napoleon's forces, who would "spread murder, rapine, slavery and death, in cruel and horrible wantonness" and whose orders are to "murder all our inhabitants bearing arms in our defence, violate the wives and daughters of our people, and plunder our cities"

EXTRAORDINARY?

SINCE my last arrived the Cock Boat, Revolutionaire, late D—G—N and Co. Masters, from Teignmouth. She passed Port Royal in June, 1818, and has since been on a Voyage of Discovery to the Poll, but returned without success.—On Saturday last, whilst bying at the Bank near Temple Bar, she suddenly stuck in the mud;—and immediately made Signals of Distress, and after many duits and difficulties was warped into a dry Dock, when the Damage was found to be to such an extent as to render her not Sea-worthy, and she will consequently be shortly broken up, and the Materials sold for Fire Wood.—The dry Rot appeared to have made great invages, owing to her principal Supporters being of Thistle-wood, instead of Heart of Ook.—The Master and Crew are very sickly, and it is expected they will be soon placed on Haif Pay.—The Scurry also is prevalent among them, which renders it probable that they will be also placed on short Allowance.

It is understood that a quantity of the Stores of the above Boat, consisting of Hand Grenades, Pikes, Daggers, Cuthases, and Shoe-Maker's Knives, will be put up to Auction; and have for that purpose been lately removed into a Stable in Cato-street, for convenience of Sale.

The WHITE HATS lately worn by the Crew were presented on a late Occasion to the Manchester Radicals, as a Token of Sympathy.

The Captain is quite inconclible at his loss, and is constantly singing the Song of the Old Commodore.



The boat, *Revolutionaire* is suffering from dry-rot, "owing to her principal Supporters being of *Thistle-wood*, instead of Heart of Oak", with the stores of the boat "consisting of Hand Grenades, Pikes, Daggers, Cutlasses, and Shoe-Maker's Knives, will be put up to Auction; and have for that purpose been lately removed into a Stable in Cato-Street, for convenience of sale". Mention is also made of the Manchester radicals and White Hats (probably relating to Peterloo and Henry Hunt)





Notes that sailors, sometimes after many years to sea, are often not paid what they are owed, leading them to sell their wages "at very great loss", which makes them incapable of paying his creditors, leading to tradesmen not being paid, and seamen deserting or entering into 'foreign service'. Worn to corners, internally lightly browned, G¹ and G² have been opened a little roughly, leading to a tear of head of G¹ catching text but without loss. Largely unopened at head. With one plate (a plan of the tea room). The printer, James Lake (fl. 1807-1830), was also a bookseller, stationer, bookbinder, librarian/owner of circulating library, insurance agent and a ship owner (see BBTI). 

Situate in Bampfylde-Lane, at the Sign of the Great Cann, in the Parish of Spreyton, for Sale of the Undermentioned Live and Dead Stock. The printer is probably Thomas Flindell fl. 1812-1824 (see BBTI). Relating mainly to local politicians ('Bampfylde-Lane' presumably relates to Sir Charles Warwick Bampfylde, an Exeter MP between 1796 and 1812), there is also a mention of 'a large lot of White Hats on dirty poles', which presumably relates to Henry Hunt who was famous for wearing a white hat. The individual disguised as, 'One Old Poltimore [a village in Devon] Cock, without spurs, having Chicken by various Hens', remains unknown to this cataloguer [004063] £150.00



Attractive image of an airman with his finger up to his lips. The designer is seemingly unknown, sometimes attributed to Charles John Noke the ceramicist, but he was dead by 1941. There was an 'L Noke' listed as an artist who sold work to the War Artist's Advisory Committee, but nothing definitive. The IWM have both this, and the Australian reprint of this poster, printed by McLaren and Co., where the airman is described as being of the Royal Australian Air Force [004022] £250.00
