





The broadside is approximately 100mm x 480mm in size. probably from 1893, browned, creased from central horizontal fold

with small splits to that fold. Based at Earls Court, attractions included water polo, log rolling, canoe making, a mermaid ballet, and a water chute. The handbill is approximately 125mm x 190mm in size, dated 1875, with a small amount of loss to corners. A show at the Clapham and Brixton baths, it features Boyton in his suit (similar to a modern day wet suit), and swimming competitions. There is a woodcut taken from *The Graphic*, published in 1874, showing Boyton in his suit. Finally a carte-de-visite, approximately 65mm x 105mm, published by A. R. Thomas in Birmingham, of Boyton again in his suit. "Paul Boyton (often misspelled Boynton; 29 June 1848 - 18 April 1924), known as the Fearless Frogman, was a showman and adventurer some credit as having spurred worldwide interest in water sports as a hobby, particularly open-water swimming." 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## 'the most dangerous class'

**[06]** [Chartist Agitation and the Railways] **London and North Western Railway and the Chartists**. Watford: No Publisher, 1848. First Edition. 4to. Unbound. Ephemera. Good. Four documents relating to the Chartist demonstration of April 10th 1848, and the reaction to it by the London and North Eastern Railway. Lightly creased, the fourth named is lightly soiled, with a chip to head just catching a couple of letters, but with no loss of sense, and a couple of closed tears from the right hand edge, catching a couple of letters, but again with no loss of sense. On April 10, 1848, the Chartist movement held a mass meeting on Kennington Common in London, there were fears of a large disturbance,

or indeed a revolution. "For the authorities the event was a source of concern. Queen Victoria and the 200 or so people in her retinue were sent to Osborne House on the Isle of Wight, far from the tumult of the capital. As the seats of power lay north of the River Thames, the Chartists were only authorized to gather on the south bank, on Kennington Common. The Duke of Wellington was brought into the discussions on the defence plans drawn up by the government. 4000 policemen and 8000 soldiers were mobilized to guard the bridges and seats of power. 81,000 special constables were sworn in, armed with truncheons, and stationed at strategic points, in case some muscle should be needed. They were mainly members of the middle class, attached to the regime and to property: law students, shopkeepers, and employees enrolled at their employers' behest" (Bensimon, Kennington Common, 10 April 1848: The Photographs, the Chartist Crowd, and the Coachman, in Journal of Victorian Culture, Volume 29, Issue 3, July 2024, Pages 430-452). Firstly, there is a circular noting that "it is our bounden duty, as paid Servants of the Company, to protect its rights and property and circumstances require that we should hold ourselves in immediate readiness for the fulfilment of the obligation". It further notes that "where language or gesture may be used to excite provocation they must be treated with silent contempt". Secondly there is a short letter informing the bosses that "the whole of the Company's servants employed at the ?Connection department are at the ready". Thirdly, there is a letter, marked 'Private', which encloses a "list of men in the Engine Houses at Watford who have voluntarily signed a document binding themselves to protect the Company's property. In these troublous times ??? mark of confidence between the men and their employer is of ?value - more particularly in this case when I tell you that most of the signatures are those of confirmed Chartists who one and all refused to sign the paper without the addition of the underlined words. I

must beg you to understand that these men are all operative mechanics (the most dangerous class) ... I am happy to say that in case of emergency they would happily enlist themselves on the side of order and have expressed themselves anxious to be enrolled as constables", and the fourth document is a list of names from the Ballast Department who are "willing to be sworn in as Special Constables for the protection of the Company's property". An interesting collection, revealing how men were signed up as Special Constables, and showing that some, or perhaps even the majority, went against their professed beliefs, which surely would have made their loyalty in the event of a disturbance, or a revolution, uncertain [004651] **£375.00**




**[07]** [Election Accounts] **Election Accounts for the Northumberland Election of March 1820**. Alnwick and Newcastle: No Publisher, 1820. First Edition. Various. Unbound. Ephemera. Good. A small collection of manuscript material, including a small account book detailing 'election disbursements', c.20 items in all. Some light browning, a few tears where letters have been opened, account book folded with a vertical crease, but generally quite bright and clean. Charles John Brandling (1769-1826), a Tory, fought and won the Northumberland election of 1820, after many years as the M.P. for Newcastle. This collection of documents details how much he spent and what he spent it on. The accounts were prepared by Robert Thorp, the Duke of Northumberland's attorney, and two private letters here from D. W. Smith, the Duke's agent, advise Thorp on how the accounts are to be prepared, and sent to John Clayton, Brandling's Newcastle attorney. There are various rough copies, interim accounts, and lists of bills paid and to be paid, but the centrepiece is the fully detailed final statement, in a home-made notebook. Thirty-two Alwick publicans each received "the usual payment of £7/10/0 (even four 'ginshops' were paid); eleven chair-bearers received a guinea each, bailiffs and constables half that; cockades were bought (too expensively according to Clayton); 'firing guns and procuring men to draw in Mr Brandling', all cost money; Brandling spent £282 on a dinner at the 'White Swan' hotel in Alnwick; expenses for printers, musicians, bellringers, even the Town Hall cleaner got a guinea. There appears to have been some creative accounting as well, with one of 'private' letters seemingly noting an expenditure of around £764, while the 'official' account book only notes a £557 spend. An interesting overview of the vast expense of an election campaign even in largely uncontested seats where "preference of the 'independent' squirearchy for bipartisan representation, with one Member at least from among their ranks, was generally heeded" (Fisher, D. R. (Ed), The History of Parliament: the House of Commons 1820-1832, 2009) [004653] £375.00

It notes, "Whereas information hath been given to the Parliament, that the Lord Digbie (son to the Earle of Bristol) and Colonel Lunsford, with others, have gathered troops of horse, and have appeared in a warlike manner at Kingstone upon Thames in the County of Surrey, (where the Magazine of Arms for that part of the County lies) to the terrour and affright of his Majesties good subjects, and disturbance of the publike weale of the Kingdom: It is this day ordered by the Lords and Commons in Parliament, that the Sheriffs of the severall Counties of England and Wales, calling to their assistance the Justices of the Peace, and the trained Bands of those severall Counties (or so many of them as shall be necessary for the service) shall suppresse all unlawfull Assemblies gathered together to the disturbance of the publike peace of the Kingdom in their severall Counties respectively: And that they take care to secure the said Counties, and all the Magazines in them". It reprints a letter of support from Joseph Hume, the radical M.P. (1777-1855, see ODNB), and is introduced by F. W. Place (probably Francis Place, 1771-1854, see ODNB). Wooler of the *Black Dwarf*, and Edward Baines of the *Mercury*, accusing both of being in the pay of the Whigs, and in Baines' case, being a government spy. Atkinson, William (1758-1846), pamphleteer and poet, was ordained in 1782, and was the subject of a bitter pamphlet war when he was appointed to a lectureship, which a local grammar school Master, Edward Baldwyn, had expected to go to him. Baldwyn published two satirical pamphlets under the pseudonym Trim: A *Critique on the Poetical Essays of the Rev. William Atkinson* (1787), and *A Congratulatory Letter to the Rev. William Atkinson* (1790). "In these he maintained that, although not actually indecent, Atkinson's work was well calculated to encourage licentiousness among young readers. Although the poetry itself was also lambasted, Trim

concentrated mostly on what he took to be Atkinson's hypocrisy and conservative tendencies, apparently based on sermons preached by Atkinson in Bradford condemning card-playing and dancing. Atkinson, however, was not defenceless against such attacks; he kept a printing press in his home and often issued pamphlets of his own on ecclesiastical and political topics under the name of the Old Inquirer. Between 1794 and 1829 he published a further twenty-five pamphlets, all of which took an increasingly reactionary approach to a variety of political, religious, and economic subjects" (ODNB). Lightly creased from old folds, very lightly browned, a couple of closed tears around old seal, catching a couple of letters, but with no loss of sense, dated in pencil in another hand to top right hand corner, with address of Bentham and drop head title in ink to final leaf. Dated October 4th, 1819, and sent from Burdett's family seat, Ramsbury Manor, it deferentially invites Bentham to spend some time at Burdett's house, addressing him as "My very worthy Master", and promising Bentham that he will "endeavour to make everything as agreeable and convenient to you as I can, you shall have a vibrating room for yourself and room next to it for your scribe, you shall come out when you please and remain alone as much as you like, in short you shall do just as if you were at home, and no one will ever ask any questions - In short you shall be perfect master of your time and actions". Burdett notes at the foot of the letter that "Bickersteth [Henry Bickersteth, later Baron Langdale] is I hope coming perhaps you may journey together".

Burdett and Bentham were regular and long term correspondents. It was probably this letter which elicited the response by Bentham to Burdett [Letter 2565] printed in Conway (Ed), The Correspondence of Jeremy Bentham, Volume 9 January 1817 to June 1820, page 356. "Much Esteemed Disciple, Man proposes: God disposes. In the event of a removal, I have all along had it fully in contemplation to profit by thy kind invitation last year signified; but Providence has ordained it otherwise. The cold weather is now come: to my weak eyes the heat and light of an ordinary fire are altogether unsupportable. I have here, as thou mayest perhaps remember, an apparatus for keeping the seat of my meditations in a state of moderate warmth, without visible fire. At Ford Abbey I had an apparatus for that same purpose: otherwise I could not, as in winter I did, have sojourned there. The produce of thy fields arrived here in safety: it hath assisted me in the support of my mortifications. Forget not the children of men: wicked and ungrateful as they are, keep thyself for their sake ... The Hermit of Queen's Square Place. Given at this my hermitage, this 5th October, 1819". 

I had not thought them capable of such dirty talk", he goes on to ask which gender Merriman's new child is, and notes that "poor Peplow is dead and has left a widow and 2 children. God help them!" The letter probably relates to Cooper rediscovering his belief. Though he had been a prominent Chartist (and jailed as such), and a freethinker, he never really lost his earlier strong religious convictions, and in 1856 he "announced his rediscovery of Christianity", which led to him being involved in "angry debates". He took part in measures for the better treatment of the insane, and provided for the erection of a house for pauper lunatics near Wakefield. He favoured the abolition of the corn laws in conjunction with the 'fund law' and game laws. He supported calls for the reform of the House of Commons and advocated the abolition of the protestant church in Ireland ... In 1831 several of the radical political unions of Yorkshire were anxious to elect him to parliament; he pledged himself to serve if elected, but declined to come forward as a candidate. Much of his correspondence with the political unions of Halifax, Huddersfield, Dewsbury, and Wakefield, along with some observations on the corn and fund laws and parliamentary reform, is contained in a volume published as An Address to the Electors and Others of the West-Riding of the County of York (1833)" (ODNB). 
